

Declaration of Helsinki

- World Medical Association was founded in 1947.
- Preceded by Declaration of Geneva 1948.
- Originally adopted in June 1964 in Helsinki, Finland.
- Seven revisions most recent in October 2013.




Oral infection – systemic health














- Bacteremia of oral origin
- Medically compromised patients



• Oral biofilm contains thousands of microbial species.

• 1 mg of dental plaque = 10⁹ microbes.



The elderly are particularly liable for infection complications

Why is it important to maintain maintain good oral hygiene in the aging and frail?




Poor oral hygiene may be the reason for pneumonia



Removable dental prostheses and cardiovascular survival: a 15-year follow-up study. (Janket et al. J Dent 2013;41:740-6).




Hämäläinen et al. Gerodontology 2004; 21:209-215 **Oral infections as predictors of mortality**

Acutely hospitalized elderly had significantly more signs of dental infections than home living elderly (Meurman et al. J Dent Res 1997, 76, 1271-1276)






Taking a decision...

Preserving a healthy mouth contributes to better OHRQoL*


